2. Project Summary and Objectives

The Project objectives are to improve access to reliable and resilient urban services and strengthen institutional capacities of urban service providers, and local governments in selected cities of the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) province. These objectives will be achieved through three interlinked outputs: (i) climate resilient and gender friendly urban infrastructure and services improved; (ii) institutional capacity and gender inclusiveness of urban service providers, provincial government, and city governments strengthened; and (iii) women's participation in urban governance and access to economic opportunities increased.

5. Project Implementation Update

The Project made reasonable start after the loan effectiveness by exceeding the contract awards and disbursements target in the first year of implementation (2022-23). However, the momentum has slowed down. A total of 13 civil works contracts have been awarded. 12 are under implementation, and 1 was terminated with ADB's approval for termination for convenience. These contracts relate to water supply (Peshawar, Kohat, Mingora, and Abbottabad), wastewater collection and treatment (Kohat and Mardan) and development of green urban spaces (Peshawar, Kohat, Mingora, and Abbottabad). Additionally, six other civil works contracts are in the planning stage. Major contracts for Integrated Solid Waste Management (ISWM) Component, representing about 30% of the total physical works, have not been made yet. Procurement documents were sent to ADB for review and clearance with expected contract award in Q3 of 2024. A workshop on the selected Design-Build-Operate model for SWM implementation was held and received significant interest from bidders. A summary of the proposed DBO methodology for procurement of works have been sent to Local Government Department for approval. It is expected that the tendering for the SWM will commence after the approval of procurement methodology by the provincial authorities. The project has also awarded twenty-one individual consultancy contracts under implementation.

Financial Management:

Due to low competition, the hiring process for key staff positions, including Directors and individual consultants, has been delayed. This delay affects the positions of Director of Finance and Administration, along with two other Finance and Accounts posts that were advertised and expected to be filled next quarter. The Internal Auditor position remains vacant; however, CVs are currently being shortlisted and evaluated.

Additionally, there are five outstanding WSSC Audited Entity Financial Statements (AEFS) for FY 2022 and FY 2023. Specifically, the reports for Mardan and Mingora for FY 2022, and Mardan, Mingora, and Peshawar for FY 2023, are overdue. On March 27th, 2024, the Bank issued a notice letter to the government, requesting immediate attention and action to address the non-compliance status under the Project.

6. Status of the Grievance Redress Mechanism (GRM)

A 3-tiered project GRM is established and functional at the field, city, and PMU levels. ADB mission noted that the GRM is easily accessible, gender inclusive, culturally appropriate, widely publicized, and well-integrated in the project's management system. A total of 43 complaints were received by CIU Swat and all were resolved. These

were mostly related to the size of the affected land, type of land and different land parcels / Khasras, and some mutation issues. A total of 6 complaints were received in Peshawar out of which 4 were resolved and two are unresolved. The remaining 2 are related to land disputes. A total of 21 complaints were received in Mardan out of which 20 were resolved and one is unresolved. Two complaints were received by CIU Kohat and were resolved. Whereas 10 complaints were received in Abbottabad out of which 8 were resolved and two are unresolved. One complaint was registered on 16th May 2024 in AIIB complaint portal by the resident of Mingora, Swat. The Complainant alleges delayed project progress, poor quality of construction and workmanship and as a result the local people's lives were badly affected. The complainant also registered a complaint in ADB's CRP. CEIU approached the complainant requesting permission to refer his complaint to ADB to which he responded by stating that there is no need as he has been working with ADB for a month and ADB was doing well. CEIU closed the matter and encouraged the complainant to continue working with ADB.

7. Results Monitoring (please refer to the full RMF, which can be found on the last page of this PIMR)

As the civil works have just started, results are not yet available. However, monitoring is carried out by the PMCSC along with the CIUs. Results will be reported when measurable progress has been achieved on ground.
